# **Tulip Troubles**

For the second year in a row, my Tulips were a **dud** this year. We had beautiful healthy green leaves,



have been in the ground for three years. Are my bulbs aged out? Too much shade? Turns out, there are multiple

reason spring bulbs may only leaf out.

#### Pests:

There are multiple culprits who might enjoy a tasty bulb for breakfast. If they eat enough of the bulb, the plant might have enough energy to leaf, but not to bloom. According to the University of Illinois Extension field mice are one of the worst for sneaking a taste of the Tulips.

#### Improper cooling time:

This one doesn't apply to my bulbs, but if you had dug your bulbs to move them to another location it could be your issue. A tulip bulb needs to go through 12-16 weeks of chilling weeks. So, if you dug them and didn't get them replanted until the spring they will not have had enough cold weather to bloom.

#### Improper Care:

You may be tempted to cut off the dying leaves when they start to turn brown, but your bulbs will thank you to let them die back naturally and then remove them. Those leaves are feeding your bulbs to provide enough energy to bloom next year.

## Improper planting depth or sunlight:

A tulip bulb naturally contains enough energy to help the leaves push up through a certain depth of soil. If they are having to work their way up through more than they prefer the energy that would have been used for blooming must go to the leaves to break ground.

Our sun gives plants the strength to bloom. If we start taking a full sun plant and give it too much shade one of the first things to be affected with be the bloom power.

#### Tulip Fun Facts:

- \* In 17th-century Holland, the new tulip was such the rage and fashion that a handful of bulbs was worth about \$44,000.
- \* If you dig up a tulip bulb in midsummer, it's not the same bulb you planted last fall. It's her daughter.

Even while the tulip is blossoming, the bulb is dividing for the next generation.

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#### The Year of the Lantana

The National Garden Bureau has selected the Lantana as the 2020 'year of' annual. These plants are adored by butterflies, bees and hummingbirds for many reasons: sweet nectar, bright color, and the overall flower form.

Lantana grows in a multitude of colors including; pink with yellow, all yellow, red with orange and yellow.... the shades vary within those color combos as well. Lantana camara will be a more mounded form where the Lantana sellowiana will have a more widespread or trailing habit.

Be sure to give this plant a good look when dreaming of your annual containers!
