I may not have been the first one to have a home grown tomato, but that didn't bother me a bit. I was out for the produce and with patience, boy did I get it. So, please don't give up! We have plenty of growing days left in the season!

We have plenty of varieties of tomatoes and peppers with varying stages of maturity left. Below is a list of days to maturity for a few common garden plants. If you have questions on something specific, don't hesitate to reach out.

Beans - 50 days to maturity

Cucumbers - 55-60 days to maturity

Summer Squash (Zucchini) - 45 days to maturity

Carrots - 70-80 days to maturity

Watermelon - 90 days to maturity

Pumpkin - 100 days to maturity





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## Teeny Tiny Perennials



### **Sandwort 'Blizzard Compact'**

This small ground cover plant will quickly fill areas along walkways. Does best with an 1" of water during spring and summer months. Should not be allowed to dry out. Will cascade over walls. Deer resistant. 4-8" tall and 6-10" wide. Zone 3-7. Full Sun.



### **Rockfoil 'Rocco Red'**

This spring blooming perennial is ideal for tight spaces. Slowly creeps to 3-5" tall and 6-8" wide. Zone 4. Full sun.



### **Candytuft Iberis 'Snowsation'**

Masses of white blooms in late spring. Full sun and rock gardens are a great place for this sweet plant. 6" tall 12" wide. Zone: 4-9 Full Sun.

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**Clematis pictured at top of page:  
'Multi-Blue'**

Part-Sun, Zone 4, 6-8' tall

Don't forget to keep their "head in the sun and feet in shade." This means that root system will benefit from some shade during the heat of the day. 'Multi-Blue' is a type 2 Clematis. Clematis in this group produce flowers on both the prior year's growth and the current seasons. The best time to prune them is in early spring.



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
